# **Massachusetts Clean Energy Center (MassCEC)**

#### **History:**

- ➤ MassCEC was established by <u>Chapter 23J of the General Laws</u> and **began operating in 2009**.
- ➤ We are a quasi-public agency funded via the Massachusetts Renewable Energy Trust Fund, which was authorized by the Massachusetts Legislature in 1997 as part of the electric utility deregulation process.

#### **About:**

- ➤ MassCEC is a state economic development agency dedicated to accelerating the growth of the clean energy sector across the Commonwealth to spur job creation, deliver statewide environmental benefits and to secure long-term economic growth for the people of Massachusetts. MassCEC works to increase the adoption of clean energy while driving down costs and delivering financial, environmental, and economic development benefits to energy users and utility customers across the state.
- MassCEC's mission is to accelerate the clean energy and climate solution innovation that is critical to meeting the Commonwealth's climate goals, advancing Massachusetts' position as an international climate leader while growing the state's clean energy economy.

# 40101(d) Program Background

#### **FEDERAL PROGRAM**

- Section 40101(d) of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law -"Preventing Outages and Enhancing the Resilience of the Electric Grid"
- Formula funding opportunity
  - Each state is eligible for annual distributions of funding between FY22-FY26
  - MA is eligible for approximately \$4.5 million annually
  - Funding must be spent within five years of award
- ➤ The funding aims to:



Enhance the resilience of the electric grid



**Prevent outages** 



Mitigate the impact of disruptive events

#### **MA PROGRAM**

- ➤ The Commonwealth has been awarded its FY22 and FY23 formula funding, totaling \$9.2M
- MassCEC and DOER developed the program to:



Improve energy reliability and resilience



Support decarbonization efforts



Advance environmental justice



# **Program Eligibility**

#### **ELIGIBLE SUBAWARDEES**

- ➤ Electric grid operators;
- Electricity storage operators;
- Electricity generators;
- ➤ Transmission owners or operators;
- ➤ Distribution providers;
- ➤ Fuel suppliers; and
- > Any other relevant entity, as determined by the Secretary of DOE



# **Program Eligibility**

#### **ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES**

- Weatherization technologies and equipment;
- Fire-resistant technologies and fire prevention systems;
- Monitoring and control technologies;
- Undergrounding of electrical equipment;
- Utility pole management;
- Relocation of power lines or the reconductoring of power lines with low-sag, advanced conductors;
- Vegetation and fuel-load management;

- Use or construction of distributed energy resources (DERs) for enhancing system adaptive capacity during disruptive events, including:
  - microgrids; and
  - battery-storage subcomponents
- Adaptive protection technologies;
- Advanced modeling technologies;
- ► Hardening of power lines, facilities, substations, or other systems; and
- Replacement of old overhead conductors and underground cables.

# **Small Utility Set-Aside**

#### LARGE VS SMALL ENTITIES

- ➤ Small entities are eligible subawardees that do not sell more than four million (4,000,000) MWh of electricity annually
- ► Large entities are eligible subawardees that sell more than four million (4,000,000) MWh of electricity annually OR that do not sell electricity
- ➤ DOE requires states to make a certain amount of funding available to small utilities
  - In MA, approximately 59% of customers are served by small utilities
  - Accordingly, 59% of the funding will be made available to small entities

# **Cost Match**

#### **COST MATCH REQUIREMENTS**

- ➤ Cost match is required for all subawardees per federal requirements
- ➤ Large entity cost match between 100-115% of award
- ➤ Small entity cost match between one third (1/3) and one third (1/3) + 15% of award
- > Required cost match (within specified ranges for large and small entities) will be determined upon subaward notification

MassCEC held first public hearing and accepted public comment on MA **Program Narrative** 

Dec. 2023

MassCEC posted <u>draft</u> program guidelines for public comment

Mar. 2024

MassCEC responded to all questions and posted the responses

#### **Current Status in MA**

### **April 2024**

MassCEC applied for FY24 funding from DOE (~\$4.3 million)

**4-6 Months after application deadline**First round of
subawards will be made

# **July 2024**

Request for Proposals released

# Fall 2024 and beyond

MassCEC anticipates making subawards semiannually, each year, until funding is exhausted

Recommended projects submitted for DOE approval

Aug 2, 2024

MassCEC will post answers to submitted questions on 40101(d) webpage 2-4 Weeks postsubmission

**Likely 4-6 Months following** previous step

Award notification, dependent on DOE review timeline

#### ATTACHMENT G – EXAMPLE

#### Resilience and Reiliability Benefits and Community Engagement

Project identifies a meaningful resilience or reliability need and proposes a reasonable solution

Applicant demonstrates that the project need was identified by or with the community (for example, the project addresses a need identified in a previous vulnerability assessment, such as via the Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness ("MVP") Program). For this criterion, "the community" may refer to municipal officials, community organizations, and/or other similar entities.

Applicants have proposed a method to quantify the reliability or resilience benefits of project

Project aligns with Program Objectives outlined in the program narrative

Applicant demonstrates that the project aligns with and furthers the Commonwealth's **CECP** targets

Project will be located in an EJC and/or a DAC

Community Based Organization is part of the project leadership
